The stories are touching and feature Rory, a sweet and obedient medical service dog matched with an epileptic young girl named Corrine; Zeus, a beautiful Siberian Husky separated from his owner, Ayham, a Syrian refugee living in Berlin; and Justin Timberlake, a dewy-eyed mutt among a group of 30 dogs rescued from an overtaxed shelter in Dallas and brought to New York City so he can be adopted.



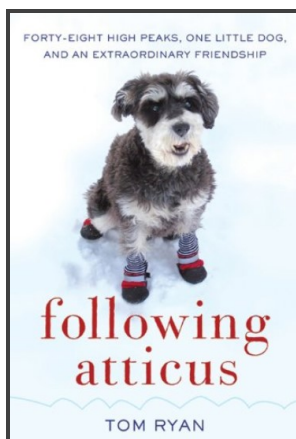

In this issue...It appears Old Man Winter really means business this year people! If you have plans to hibernate by the fire until the Spring Thaw, please consider enjoying one of the following pet-centered books.

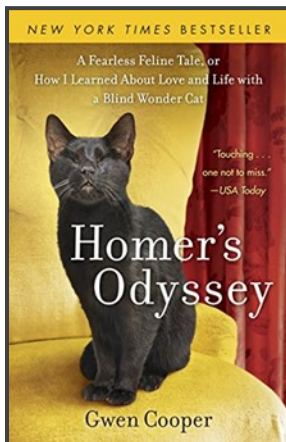


Following Atticus by Tom Ryan: This book has been around for several years and is one of the few I have read twice. It is the colorfully told story of Tom and his best friend Atticus M. Finch, an independent miniature schnauzer. I use the term “friend” in the literal sense. Tom raises Atticus from puppyhood as a partner in life more than as a pet, which suits the independent singleton pup’s personality just fine.

Tom is the owner, editor, and publisher of a small-town newspaper in the quaint and scenic Newburyport, MA. One day he agrees to take in an abandoned, elderly schnauzer. Sadly, Max was with him only a short time before he passed away, but he inspired Tom to continue sharing his life with a canine companion. After much thought, he selects a miniature schnauzer, who was born an only puppy, gives him the middle name “Maxwell” in honor of his late friend, and the adventures begin.

The book humorously documents the daily goings on in Newburyport, the duos’ interactions with the quirky townsfolk, and the unique way Atticus is raised. Detailed descriptions of the beautiful scenery provided by the surrounding mountain range makes you feel like you are right there with them. The story really takes off when Tom decides that he and Atticus will honor the memory of a late friend by hiking all 48 peaks of the White Mountain range not once, but twice in single winter season to raise funds for cancer research. Since neither sedentary, overweight newspapermen or fluffy little dogs are known for their rugged hiking abilities, this endeavor makes for a very entertaining book. While this is a great “dog story”, it is so much more and will appeal to those who have never owned a dog, as well as those who have.

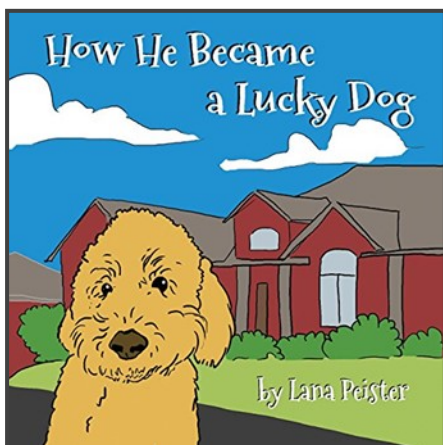
I will reference a quote from Tom Ryan to describe my feelings as I neared this book’s end: *“I have come to judge a good story as one that makes me feel as if I’m losing a friend when I read the final page, close the book, and put it down for the last time.”* The good news is that Tom wrote a second book several years later titled “Will’s Red Coat”. Stay tuned for a review in the next issue of Animal Tales.



Homer's Odyssey by Gwen Cooper: There are tons of great dog books out there, but cat stories are a bit harder to come by. When was the last time you heard about a cat jumping in to a raging river to pull their owner to safety or running messages across a World War I battlefield, huh? Well, this isn't quite that, but I think you will find Homer to be a hero in his own right and Gwen's writing style to be enjoyable.

Gwen Cooper was determined to say "NO" when it was suggested she adopt a four-week-old stray kitten. Her life was complicated. She already had two cats, an anemic bank account, and had just been through a break up. After all, she couldn't save every pet with a sad story that crossed her path, but...she agreed to meet him anyway. Homer was recovering from surgery. He'd had a horrible eye infection that had required surgical removal of both his eyes. He was totally blind.

Upon meeting this tiny kitten, she was moved by the "innate source of courage within him, some inborn willingness to engage the world openly and joyfully, that even all the hardship and suffering he'd been through hadn't taken away from him". She ended up taking him home not out of pity, but admiration. I know you will enjoy reading about how Homer, Gwen, and her existing feline family adapt to their new situation, including being separated for days due to the World Trade Center collapse and fending off an intruder that broke into their home in the middle of the night. In the end, Homer the Wonder Cat did more to fulfill his human's life that she could have ever expected.



How He Became a Lucky Dog by Lana Peister: Here's one for the kiddos! It's not often in a town the size of Kearney you can find a book published about a local celebrity Goldendoodle written by his hometown mom. That alone makes this book worth a look. The fact that it also provides an important lesson about making sure you are ready to bring a pet into your life and has a happy ending makes this an easy choice for your child.

"Joey" was originally adopted by a family who did not have permission to bring a puppy into their home. As a result, at just 4 months of age, he was forced into the unknown and on to another family he'd never met. Suddenly, he was being called "Franklin" and wondering how long he would get to stay in this new place. He was loved by his family, but it wasn't long until there was a new human baby on the way, which meant no more time for Franklin. Off to a foster home he went to face new smells, unfamiliar people, and an uncertain future.

Spoiler Alert: Our furry protagonist eventually becomes "Lucky" when the Peisters adopt him from foster care. Lucky even ends up being the inspiration for a specialty shop and working as a Therapy Dog! You can read about his road to success by picking up a copy of the book, which features rhyme scheme writing - sure to make it a fun read for the little ones, at Lucky Dog's Place Pet Boutique in Downtown Kearney. You can keep track of Lucky and his siblings Indy and Nilla, on the shop's Facebook page. If you're lucky, you might even get to meet them when visiting the shop!

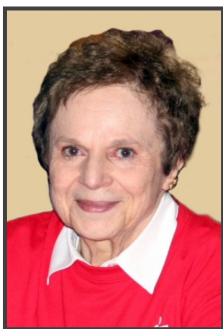
